OVERVIEW & MONTHLY ROUND UP

In May FemLINKPACIFIC commemorated the first decade of advancing our mission to provide a safe space via community radio and enabling women from within their local communities to claim and localize UNSCR1325 as well as CEDAW with the theme "Communicating Peace, Development, Diversity, Security and Freedom"

Our Radio with Pictures campaign enabled 82 women leaders in all their diversities, representing a collective constituency of 1811 members, in Nadi, Nausori and Labasa to communicate their peace, human security and development priorities. Additionally in May through our rural network activities 94 women, particularly rural women, disabled women, young women and transgender women came together to discuss and document their collective priorities in Labasa, Nausori, Tavua/Rakiraki, Ba and Nadi

It was clear across the 3 divisions that women are not being accounted for – current development processes are not accounting for commitments to CEDAW or the National Women's Plan of Action whether it is addressing environment security (disaster risk reduction, responses and management/recovery as well as climate change adaptation) or economic security which is closely linked to food and nutrition security.

Without women's equal access to and participation in development processes from the district and tikina level, gender inclusive development will not happen and we will continue to hear the call for improvements in rural infrastructure (roads, water and electricity supply) and enhancing health services as well as guaranteeing a life free of violence and crime.

Meanwhile, 41% of respondents (143 women) in our monthly household income and expenditure survey highlighted the struggle to meet cost of living expenses such as food, household bills, in addition to education, transport and health expenses being priorities when earning less than \$50 to at least \$200 a week.

Our survey this month has once again highlighted the prevalence of the information-communication and digital divide for 82% of respondents which is why we also celebrate that over the last 10 years we are enabling women who would otherwise be silent or invisible to claim their communication rights.

As WACC says community radio is a key to participatory development and change: "Community radio enables people - especially marginalized sectors such as women and youth - to voice their concerns and to unite around common causes in order to challenge decision-makers and create communities that better respond to their needs. Community radio, alongside digital platforms and citizen journalism, is fast becoming one of the focal points for grassroots democracy, good citizenship and good governance." HOUSEHOLD INCOME AND

EXPENDITURE SURVEY (HIES) FINDINGS: MAY 2014

Overview of respondents:



A total of 143 respondents took part in the monthly WHIES from 3 rural centres in Ba, Tavua/Rakiraki and Labasa

73% of the respondents were between the ages of 32-53.

21% of the respondents indicated to be either widowed, divorced or in a relationship where the rest were married and responsible for an average 3-5 children.

74% of the respondents were Itaukei while the remainder were of Indian descent.

11% of the respondents have <u>NO ACCESS</u> to water Supply to their Households that were from Labasa. 41% indicated to be main income earners, earning from less than \$50 to at least \$200 a week.

Economic issues:

73% Main income earners indicated to earn less than FDJ\$50-\$FDJ\$200 a week.

Access to health services:

64% visit health centres/hospitals once a month or a few times a year, with medical costs topping the list of major expenses.

Access to information and communication:

All respondents indicated the radio as main source of information listening to news and information on a daily basis or once a week. Majority 82% of women indicate to have never accessed the internet.

76% of the respondents have access to mobile phones with a majority of this number subscribing to the Vodafone and Inkk network.

Access to power and decision making:

18% of respondents indicate to be affiliated with a NGO or to have accessed information from local government.

24% of respondents have attended workshops/consultations on the constitution.

Our side a little improvements because shelter we have it and washrooms same conditions from 20 years because I'm here from 20 years but no changes in the washroom, we are paying 20cents but no changes - SANGEETA DEVI 29, Nausori Market.

First of all the rubbish bins ,I think they are not washing nicely and drains and the most of the time the water supply and when we go on Saturdays the cleaners come in and not clean nicely and they give us notice they cleaning market - **SANGEETA DEVI 29, Nausori Market.**

HERE ARE THE WOMEN: RURAL WOMEN DEFINE THEIR HUMAN SECURITY PRIORITIES

POLITICAL (IN) SECURITY:

I think the whole system should be changed, the system out there the, the officials sitting in the office, the department, the whole system should be changed because they sitting there for a very long period of time and they are not taking any action so in my opinion I think all the system should change so we can see what the other next generation officials can do for us... the system I mean the minister who is sitting in the POLICE, HEALTH Department, SOCIAL WELFARE Department, and you know all the department first of all-Shalini Chand, 39, Secretary of SHEETAL SHARDA MAHILA Women's group

We want to see the qualification, you know the qualification details of a person who is wanting to stand for elections, we want to know details of the person so we can know that he is the one who can fulfil what he promises us - Litia Naitanui, 46, President Rewa Disabled Persons Organisation.

Climate change is affecting our food supply I was asking my husband why is our pawpaws turning yellow. He's done some programme with climate change. Changes in climate and how well our food are growing in some areas due to climate change whether we use to grow these food in this season because before we use to know these food grows in this season we can't grow those food well now - Ilisabeta, Ba Mission Hospital Dietitian.

ECONOMIC (IN) SECURITY

I always buy and sell my products, when we buy banana from the farmers, sometimes the prices go high and we have less profit to earn on that day and it will affect that we can't use our capital to buy and to use that to buy food and what we want- Mereia Tabuvale, Bulileka mother's Club

The Cost of living is high the price for the Sugar Industry is not very high and the cost of fertilizer and labour cost is very high, that is why I can put the three Food Groups on the table – Saras Singh, 57, Ganesh Mothers Club

FOOD (IN) SECURITY:

Food security means having enough to feed the family and having abit of of surplus having enough quality food to feed everyone in the family so that they meet their nutritional needs and yet they still have enough surplus to feed the family on the other hand that's food security. – **Ilisabeta, Ba Mission Hospital Dietitian.**

Food security to us elderly are very important. We need to have a healthy meal and also we have to look out for our health. As we are getting old we need to be very conscious of our health – Prahalad, 74, Ba Senior Citizens' Centre

HEALTH (IN) SECURITY:

Medical wise we want to be served as proper as a person as we are part of a nation - Litia Naitanui, 46, President Rewa Disabled Persons Organisation.

The health system should also be good ... every now and then once we go to the hospital the system is not good and the doctors are not on time, we can see that the medicines are not enough for everybody so what I was thinking the hospital system should be changed-Shalini Chand, 39, Secretary of SHEETA SHARDA MAHILA Women's group

Health service, the transport is too late like when we ring the ambulance, it takes a lot of time then the transport will come, the health to provide more transport for us – Mereia Tabuvale, Bulileka mother's Club

MEDIA MONITORING

The Global Media Monitoring Project (GMMP) provides a framework to analyze new media content. The ultimate goal of the GMMP is

- To map the representation and portrayal of women in the world's news media
- To develop a grassroots research instrument
- To build solidarity among gender and communication groups worldwide
- To create media awareness To develop media monitoring skills on an international level

Between 1995- 2005 GMMP revealed that women's representation within mainstream content was dramatically low where only 21% of those interviewed or who were the subject of news content were females.

FemLINKPACIFIC undertakes news media analysis on a daily basis to gauge where women are and are not making the news. In May 2014, the themes where women made the news were:

- ✓ Politics and Law
- ✓ Young Woman elections candidate victim of cyber/sexual harassment
- ✓ Women in elections
- ✓ Women priorities mandate of political parties
- ✓ Woman Judge appointment to UN in Geneva as Fiji's permanent representative
- ✓ Women in business networking and success stories
- ✓ Women in fashion
- ✓ Women's achievement in sports
- ✓ Women nurses receive training to advance skills to better services with Diabetes
- ✓ Women provincial council meetings
- ✓ Women in separate traffic accidents in the month
- ✓ Women and young women subjected to sexual violence.
- ✓ Human Trafficking

Online media content produced by Radio Australia, Radio New Zealand International, the Fiji Times, Fiji Sun and Fiji Village showed that women were making the news because of outstanding achievements in fields as education, sports and the political space leading up to national elections.

In the Solomon Islands women and children's welfare was of great concern after riots broke out in the streets of Honiara that were led by those displaced by the floods. Women blamed the slow response and inadequate supply of rations to the flood victims by the government that led to this display of frustration by the people.
