New Nauru COVID-19 video animation about the safety of women and children

Wednesday 25 November 2020 (Pacific Islands): In a first for Nauru, a new video animation is being released about the safety of women and children in their homes during this COVID-19 pandemic.

Being launched during 16 Days of Activism Against Gender-Based Violence, the 'Staying Safe at Home' video addresses domestic and family violence which typically increases during times of crisis such as COVID-19.

The Ministry of Home Affairs and its Ewak n Erateko Safe House has taken a lead role in developing the video, produced by Australia's Pacific Women Shaping Pacific Development (*Pacific Women*) in partnership with the Pacific Community (SPC).

The video animation is one of five created by *Pacific Women* for; Federated States of Micronesia (FSM) and Chuuk Women's Council's new Tongen Inepwineu Counselling Centre (TICC); republic of Marshall islands (RMI) with Women United Together Marshall Islands (WUTMI) Weto in Mour domestic violence program; Nauru with the Ewak n Erateko Safe House and Ministry of Home Affairs; and Tuvalu with the Gender Affairs Division and Social Welfare Department.

Its launch comes during the 16 Days of Activism as individuals, organisations and government ministries in Nauru raise their voices to end violence against women and girls. The 16 Days of Activism is a global campaign starting on 25 November, International Day for the Elimination of Gender-Based Violence, and ends 10 December, Human Rights Day.

The Pacific has some of the highest recorded rates of violence against women and girls globally, with almost 2 out of 3 women who have been subjected to physical or sexual violence in their lifetime, almost double the global average.
